

PROGRAM SUMMARY

Bothell High School Latinx Mentorship Program

The Bothell High School Mentorship Program was put on by the students at the University of Washington Bothell. Students engaged in this program to gain key multicultural leadership skills, expand their professional and personal network, and conduct a service learning/empowerment project to benefit Latinx high school youth in surrounding communities. This year, Bothell High School has partnered closely with UWB to engage Latinx high school students in our project. This group implemented icebreakers and games to build connections while introducing one another. Scholars provided student mentoring to work through issues of academic success, motivation and inspiration, career choices, financial aid (WASFA and FAFSA), Running Start and other program interests and applications, and addressed any questions the BHS student had. Additionally, a mental health wellness training was incorporated into this project. These workshops and training are crucial to promoting the future education of these high school students so they aren't alone in this process.

PROGRAM SUMMARY

Latinos Unidos

The Latino Unidos group from Skagit Valley College targeted youth and young adults in the Skagit region. They aimed to provide information on anxiety, mental health and mental illness to those who are struggling, targeting loved ones and people they knew through communication, phone calls and in person visits. A benefit to this program was shining a light for parents to discover if their kids were experiencing mental health or anxiety problems. This group pushed hard on bringing awareness to our community about safely reintegrating into community events, diminishing the fear left behind by COVID-19, where people preferred to stay inside and avoid being infected by the virus. Interacting with other community members allows people to feel supported, and simply not alone.
